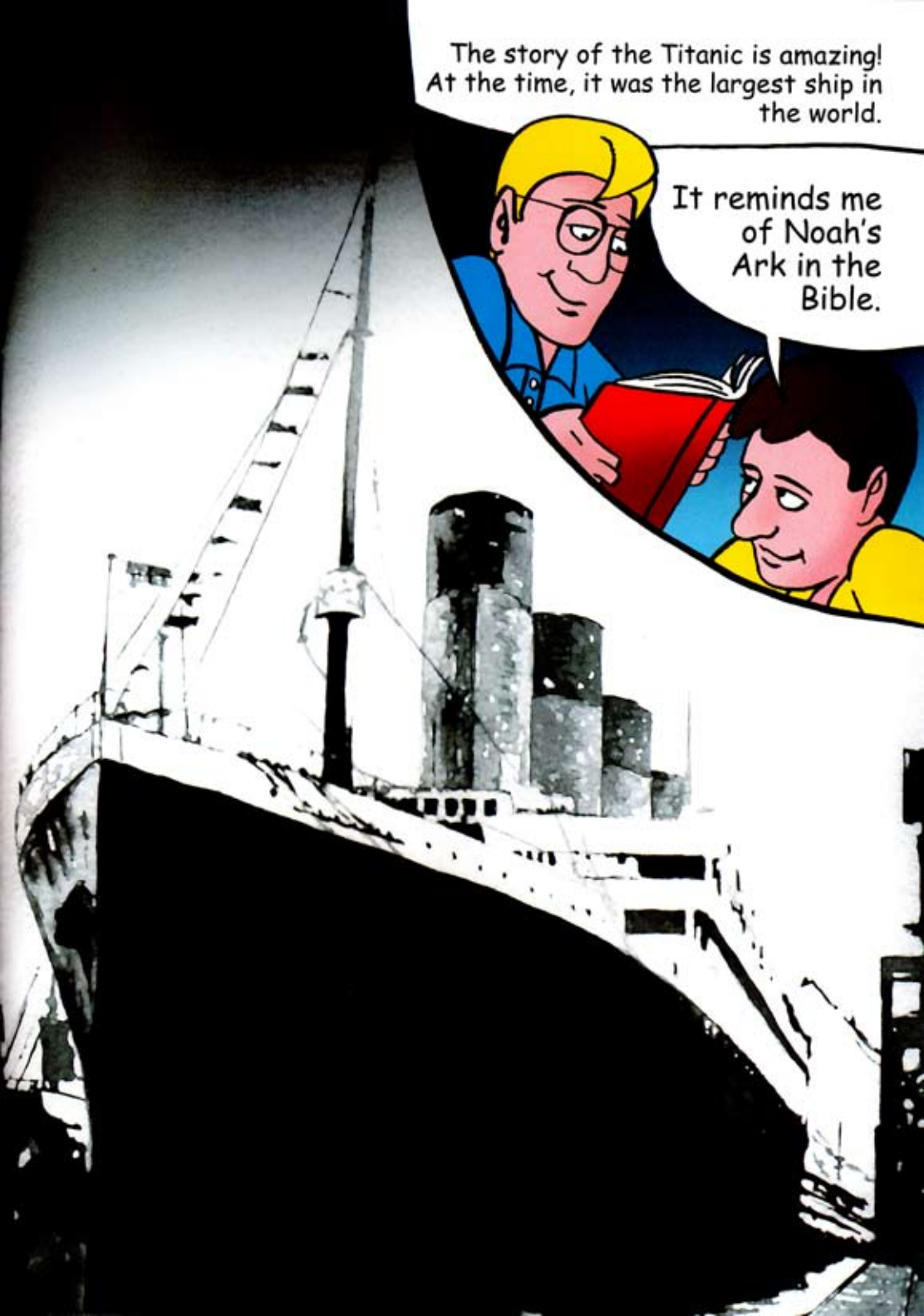
# THE ARK OF NOAH

the world.

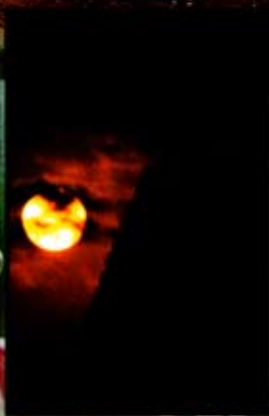
It reminds me

Most of the world's cultures have legends and folklore stories about a world-destroying flood, a man who saves the animals, and a vessel for this purpose—coincidence? Or confirmation of an ancient and real event?



You're not serious, surely? Noah's Flood was just a myth.

Funny thing, it's not just the Bible that speaks of a globe-destroying Flood, with one family and all the animals saved by being warned to build a vessel of safety.

The same basic story is found in hundreds of cultures around the world.



But those are just exaggerated local floods.

But where did all the water come from?

A local Flood would make the story foolish. Why spend years building a ship, when you could move far away? Why would birds have to go on board—they could fly across to the nearest mountain range.

And the Bible says the water rose above the highest mountains. How could that be a local flood?

The Bible indicates that most of the water came from the 'breaking up of the fountains of the great deep' (Genesis 7:11) which were only shut after five months.

It was over a year before the Ark's occupants were able to step onto dry ground. No wonder that there's water-laid rock all over the world, containing billions of buried plants and animals!



Ancient stone tablets from Mesopotamia tell a story titled 'The Epic of Gilgamesh'. In this tale of legend mixed with real-life events, a hero saves the world by building a boat on which he preserves examples of every creature, similar to the Bible event.
