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
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The Genesis account of Creation is foundational to understanding the Gospel because if there was no literal sin, no literal Fall of man, no curse of death and so on, we literally don't need to be saved from anything.



Unfortunately, many Christians wrongly perceive that the creation vs. evolution debate is just one of those many 'controversial problems' facing the church, such as gay marriage, abortion, or euthanasia. To gain a proper understanding of the real problem, see Picture 1 (p. 4).

The Lord Jesus spoke a lot about trees and their fruit. For example, in Matthew 7:16–19, He said: "You will recognize them by their fruits. Are grapes gathered from thornbushes, or figs from thistles? So, every healthy tree bears good fruit, but the diseased tree bears bad fruit. A healthy tree cannot bear bad fruit, nor can a diseased tree bear good fruit. Every tree that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire."




TREES AND WORLDVIEWS

The two trees in Picture 1 represent the two dominant worldviews in Western cultures. Our worldviews are like a filter or a set of glasses through which we view all of reality, but most of us don't even realize that we actually have a worldview! The number one factor that forms our worldview is our belief about where we came from. Note the soil that these two trees are planted in. The tree of humanism (which means that man determines truth for himself) is planted in the soil of evolution.

Evolution has a materialistic foundation, meaning that matter is all that there is or ever has been. If there is no Creator God who sets the rules, you can make up your own rules about life, and truth is simply what you decide or what society establishes. It puts God out of giver of truth. The major 'problems' that many think are facing the church today, such as abortion and gay marriage, are not really the problems. They are simply the fruit (or the symptoms of an underlying problem) of humanism, rooted in the soil of evolution—its foundation. For example, if one believes that humanity is the product of time and chance, then who is to say that it's wrong to kill unborn children in the womb? After all, modern biology textbooks claim that a fetus is a throwback to our evolutionary ancestry and nothing more than an animal. Please don't misunderstand this. Evolution is not the cause of ills in our society. The ultimate problem is our sin nature, but as the noted high priest of evolution, Professor Richard Dawkins, once wrote, "Darwin made it possible to be an intellectually fulfilled atheist."1

THE FRUIT ARE NOT THE ACTUAL PROBLEMS

As the old saying goes, "An apple tree isn't an apple tree because it produces apples, it produces apples because it's an apple tree." In the same way, we are not sinners because we sin, we sin because we are sinners. The reason we are born sinners is because of 'real' history—biblical history. That is, we are literal descendants of Adam, the first human sinner (Gen. 3). So, the problem is not what we do, but who we are. It is because of what we are that




Christ came: "God shows his love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us" (Romans 5:8).

However, when our previous humanistic worldview ('there is no God') is replaced by a Christian tree (worldview), then, logically, it should be planted in the good soil of believing the Bible as God's inspired Word. We should then also see fruit in accordance with that worldview. However, please note that being a Christian doesn't automatically guarantee that one will have a Christian worldview. The believer should be consistent and recognize that our fallen state, as well as our need for salvation, comes from the foundation of biblical history; that is, the belief that the Bible is true from the beginning. Otherwise, how do we know what we are being saved from? As Christ is the founder and finisher of our faith (Hebrews 12:2), we should believe that He is the Word of God (John 1:1). Jesus said, "Abide in me, and I in you. As the branch cannot bear fruit by itself, unless it abides in the vine, neither can you, unless you abide in me. I am the vine; you are the branches. Whoever abides in me and I in him, he it is that bears much fruit, for apart from me you can do nothing. If anyone does not abide in me he is thrown away like a branch and withers; and the branches are gathered, thrown into the fire, and burned" (John 15:4-6).

HOW TO BEAR GOOD FRUIT

In the aforementioned Matthew and John passages, Jesus focused on bearing fruit. Preceding the Matthew

But note that in order to answer questions 2 or 3 you have to first decide the answer to question 1. Am I created in the image of God, or just a giant cosmic accident?


Your answer will determine what fruit you produce.

> See Picture 3. If the foundational view of God as Creator in Genesis is undermined or destroyed, we would expect the tree of Christianity to wither (as indeed is happening in many countries). Therefore, we can stand firm in our faith and fight back by similarly destroying the foundational beliefs of materialistic humanism by undermining evolution. It is unlikely that we can change our cultures by simply changing laws. How can we expect hearts to obey Christian morality? It is with God's enabling that we can change minds and then point softened hearts to the Creator. The good news for Christians today is that we have more resources to do this than at any time in church history. This magazine, with just a handful of articles, highlights that we do have answers. Such answers also destroy the base of evolution. If we do this, the worldview of humanism will decline. That's how we can change a culture. It looks like the Creator (the Lord Jesus—Colossians 1:16) knew what He was talking about when he used the analogies of trees and their fruit!





Since God is the one who made the universe, it can scarcely be 'big' to Him. Size (time and space) is only relative to us as inhabitants of this universe. Because time itself began with the creation of the physical universe, it is difficult to comprehend what eternity is. The Bible says that God existed before the universe, so He does not exist in time. Similarly, how do we imagine how 'big' God is?

To give one example, God is omnipresent (everywhere at once). If He is here with us right now and also at the edge of the universe, 14 billion light years away, one might ask, 'How long did it take Him to get there?' Of course, it took no time. Such rules only apply to us because we are part of the universe He created (time and space are related), but they don't apply to the Creator.
